## Exercises $7 \quad$ Quadratic function and equations Quadratic function/equations, supply, demand, market equilibrium

## Objectives

- know and understand the relation between a quadratic function and a quadratic equation.
- be able to solve a quadratic equation with the method of completing the square.
- be able to solve a quadratic equation by applying the quadratic formula.
- be able to solve special quadratic equations without applying the quadratic formula.
- be able to solve a quadratic equation containing a parameter.
- be able to determine the vertex form of the equation of a quadratic function out of the coordinates of the vertex and the coordinates of another point of the corresponding parabola.
- be able to determine the general form of the equation of a quadratic function out of the coordinates of three points of the corresponding parabola.
- be able to treat applied tasks in economics by means of quadratic equations or systems of quadratic equations.


## Problems

7.1 Each quadratic equation can be converted into the following general form:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{ax}^{2}+\mathrm{bx}+\mathrm{c}=0 \quad(\mathrm{a} \in \mathbb{R} \backslash\{0\}, \mathrm{b} \in \mathbb{R}, \mathrm{c} \in \mathbb{R}) \tag{*}
\end{equation*}
$$

Determine the number of solutions that a quadratic equation can have, i.e. try to find out the different possible cases of the number of solutions.

## Hints:

- Remember our discussion about the possible number of solutions of a linear equation.
- Compare the left hand side of the quadratic equation (*) with the general form of the equation of a quadratic function.
- Think of the graph of a quadratic function.

c) $\quad \frac{x-4}{x-5}=\frac{30-x^{2}}{x^{2}-5 x}$
d) $\quad \frac{x^{2}-x-2}{2-x}=1$

7.7 The quadratic equations below contain a parameter p . Therefore, the solution set of the equations will depend on the value of this parameter.

b) $\quad 3 \mathrm{x}^{2}+\mathrm{px}-\mathrm{p}=0$
7.8 A parabola has the vertex V and contains the point P .

Determine the equation of the corresponding quadratic function both in the vertex and in the general form.
a) $\quad \mathrm{V}(2 \mid 4) \quad \mathrm{P}(-1 \mid 7)$
b) $\quad \mathrm{V}(1 \mid-8) \quad \mathrm{P}(2 \mid-7)$
7.9 A parabola contains the three points $\mathrm{P}, \mathrm{Q}$, and R . Determine the equation of the corresponding quadratic function in the general form.
a) $\quad \mathrm{P}(-4 \mid 8)$
Q(0|0)
$\mathrm{R}(10 \mid 15)$
b) $\quad \mathrm{P}(1 \mid-1)$
$\mathrm{Q}(2 \mid 4)$
$R(4 \mid 8)$
7.10 Find the equilibrium quantity and equilibrium price of a service for the given supply and demand functions $f_{S}$ and $f_{d}$ :
a) supply
$p=f_{s}(q)=\left(\frac{1}{4} q^{2}+10\right)$ CHF
demand $\quad p=f_{d}(q)=\left(86-6 q-3 q^{2}\right)$ CHF
b) supply $\quad \mathrm{p}=\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{s}}(\mathrm{q})=\left(\mathrm{q}^{2}+8 \mathrm{q}+16\right)$ CHF
demand $\quad p=f_{d}(q)=\left(-3 q^{2}+6 q+436\right)$ CHF
7.11 The total costs $C(x)$ for producing $x$ items and the revenues $R(x)$ for selling $x$ items are given by

$$
\begin{aligned}
& C(x)=\left(2000+40 x+x^{2}\right) C H F \\
& R(x)=130 x C H F
\end{aligned}
$$

Find the break-even values of $x$.
7.12 The total costs $C(x)$ for producing $x$ items and the revenues $R(x)$ for selling $x$ items are given by

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathrm{C}(\mathrm{x})=\left(\mathrm{x}^{2}+100 \mathrm{x}+80\right) \mathrm{CHF} \\
& \mathrm{R}(\mathrm{x})=\left(160 \mathrm{x}-2 \mathrm{x}^{2}\right) \mathrm{CHF}
\end{aligned}
$$

How many items are to be produced and sold in order to achieve a profit of 200 CHF?
7.13 Decide which statements are true or false. Put a mark into the corresponding box. In each problem a) to c), exactly one statement is true.
a) A quadratic equation ...

- ... has no solution whenever the vertex of the graph of the corresponding quadratic function is below the x -axis.

... always has one or two solutions.
... has exactly one solution if the vertex of the graph of the corresponding quadratic function is on the x -axis.

7.7 a) $\quad \begin{array}{lll}\text { if } \mathrm{p}<\frac{1}{4}: & 2 \text { solutions } & \mathrm{x}_{1,2}=\frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{1-4 \mathrm{p}}}{2} \\ \text { if } \mathrm{p}=\frac{1}{4}: & 1 \text { solution } & \mathrm{x}=-\frac{1}{2} \\ \text { if } \mathrm{p}>\frac{1}{4}: & \text { no solution } & \mathrm{S}=\{ \}\end{array}$

Hints:

- Use the quadratic formula.
- The number of solutions ( 2 solutions, 1 solution, no solution) of the quadratic equation will depend on whether the term under the square root is positive, negative, or equal to zero.
b) $\begin{array}{lll}\text { if } \mathrm{p}<-12: & 2 \text { solutions } & \mathrm{x}_{1,2}=\frac{-\mathrm{p} \pm \sqrt{\mathrm{p}^{2}+12 \mathrm{p}}}{6} \\ \text { if } \mathrm{p}=-12: & 1 \text { solution } & \mathrm{x}=2 \\ \text { if }-12<\mathrm{p}<0: & \text { no solution } & \mathrm{S}=\{ \} \\ \text { if } \mathrm{p}=0: & 1 \text { solution } & \mathrm{x}=0 \\ \text { if } \mathrm{p}>0: & 2 \text { solutions } & \mathrm{x}_{1,2}=\frac{-\mathrm{p} \pm \sqrt{\mathrm{p}^{2}+12 \mathrm{p}}}{6}\end{array}$
$7.8 \quad$ a) $\quad y=f(x)=\frac{1}{3}(x-2)^{2}+4=\frac{1}{3} x^{2}-\frac{4}{3} x+\frac{16}{3}$
Hints:
- Start with the vertex form of the equation of a quadratic function.
- That equation contains three unknown parameters.
- Two parameters in the equation are the coordinates of the vertex V.
- P is a point of the graph of the quadratic function. Therefore, the coordinates of P must fulfil the equation of the quadratic function. This yields an equation which contains the remaining unknown parameter.
b) $\quad y=f(x)=(x-1)^{2}-8=x^{2}-2 x-7$
$7.9 \quad$ a) $y=f(x)=\frac{1}{4} x^{2}-x$
Hints:
- Start with the general form of the equation of a quadratic function.
- That equation contains three unknown parameters.
$-\mathrm{P}, \mathrm{Q}$, and R are points of the graph of the quadratic function. Therefore, the coordinates of $\mathrm{P}, \mathrm{Q}$, and $R$ must fulfil the equation of the quadratic function. This yields a system of three equations in the unknown three parameters.
b) $\quad y=f(x)=-x^{2}+8 x-8$
7.10 a) at market equilibrium: $q=4, p=14$

Hint:

- The supply and demand functions have the same values at market equilibrium.
b) at market equilibrium: $\quad \mathrm{q}=10, \mathrm{p}=196$
$7.11 \quad x_{1}=40, x_{2}=50$
Hint:
- The cost and revenue functions have the same values at the break-even points.

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { profit } \mathrm{P}(\mathrm{x})=\mathrm{R}(\mathrm{x})-\mathrm{C}(\mathrm{x})=\left(-3 \mathrm{x}^{2}+60 \mathrm{x}-80\right) \mathrm{CHF}=200 \mathrm{CHF} \\
& \Rightarrow \quad \mathrm{~S}=\{7.41 \ldots, 12.58 \ldots\}
\end{aligned}
$$

Rounding to a whole number of articles

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathrm{P}(7)=193 \mathrm{CHF} \\
& \mathrm{P}(8)=208 \mathrm{CHF} \\
& \mathrm{P}(12)=208 \mathrm{CHF} \\
& \mathrm{P}(13)=193 \mathrm{CHF}
\end{aligned}
$$

Whether to round up or down depends on whether the profit should be as close to 200 CHF as possible or at least 200 CHF.
7.13 a) $\quad 3^{\text {rd }}$ statement
b) $\quad 1^{\text {st }}$ statement
c) $\quad 2^{\text {nd }}$ statement
